Other members are joining in this effort. Barb Thompson will train the volunteers, so they will know how to respond to requests for help. We hope to have over 200 people on this list of volunteers. We would love to have you on this list, you can contact your Lt. Gov, Trustee, or contact me if you can help. We have three people in Missouri and three in Arkansas that will have a list of people willing to help.

The Clubs requesting assistance will need to meet a certain criteria before the district will send trained people to canvass your town asking people to consider joining Kiwanis. My main job is to help you grow your club.

We are the only international organization with the priority of helping children, and that can only be accomplished with more members and stronger clubs.

#### Club Revitalization Plan

Many Kiwanis Clubs have been struggling to retain members and/or recruit new members. Many clubs have fallen under charter strength of 15 members. This is a concern for the District and International. Each year the district loses many members at the end of the fiscal year and thus it's been difficult to keep a strong membership base. These issues have caused many clubs to close.

Governor Ron, along with the District Board, wants to provide assistance to those clubs in great need. The best way to do that is to work in each division to help those clubs increase membership. Kiwanis Leaders throughout the Missouri Arkansas District will be identified as coordinators of the plan. They will identify clubs in need of assistance within their region. They will also work with the local club to plan the volunteer visits.

A list of volunteers will be identified to assist clubs with the rebuilding process. Clubs will need to agree to assist and help plan the visit from volunteers to by setting up meetings and/or identifying potential members in their communities. A team of volunteers will visit the local club to meet with prospective members and help increase the club's membership. Clubs will then appoint a mentor within the club to work with the new members to help them become acquainted with Kiwanis to ensure their long-term membership.

Training will be provided to the volunteers to ensure everyone shares the same information and knows how to approach potential members.

This will be a huge assistance to the small clubs wishing to grow. But we need your help. Please let Mary Vaughan, District Secretary know if you would like to on the volunteer team or if your club needs assistance. She will then share that with the coordinators to add your club to the list. The local coordinator will contact the club to assist with the process.

We must all work together to keep Kiwanis the strong, vibrant organization that it has become. If Kiwanis ceases to exist then who will help the children of the world! Let's do this!!!

#### Eliminate Project News: October 2019

I have great news! The Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) has become the 27th country to eliminate maternal and neonatal tetanus since the Kiwanis family started fighting this disease in 2010. MO-ARK Kiwanians, you can be proud of the way you are participating in ridding the world of maternal/neonatal tetanus.

How many mothers and their babies did we in the Missouri-Arkansas District protect and save from maternal/neonatal tetanus during the 2018-2019 Kiwanis year? About 44,444!!! That is nearly 10 for every one of the members of our District. Our giving total was about \$80,000.

Internationally we are down to just 12 countries that are not validated as free from that dreaded disease (validated means that there is fewer than 1 death from maternal/neonatal tetanus per 1,000 live births).

MO-ARK's pledge to the mothers and babies of the world is to protect and save 1,000,000 mothers and their babies by giving \$1,800,000 by Dec. 31, 2020. We have now given \$1,714,000. Only \$86,000 left to reach our District goal! What can you and I do to reach our goal? First: We can give a personal gift. Any amount will help. \$1.80 protects and saves a mother and her babies.

Second: We can encourage our club to make a gift. Some clubs give 5-10 per cent of their fundraising totals to Eliminate each year. What can your club do? The record of your club's giving can be found on the MO-ARK webpage. Presidential Zellers and Mother's Day Zellers are still available for a gift of \$1250. Our District has a limited number of \$250 matching grants for

clubs and individuals who give \$1000 toward a Zeller award.

Third: If you are a MO-ARK District Board member you can encourage your region and friends to help the District reach its goal. The matching funds you have allocated will turn every \$1000 into \$5000 and speed us towards our goal.

Fourth: If you are a Lt. Gov. you can keep the Eliminate Project before the clubs in your division. Tell them how close we are to our goal and ask them to be a part of the push toward reaching that goal and celebrating our victory in 2021 or before.

Fifth: If you are an SLP advisor, invite your club members to trick or treat for UNICEF (our Eliminate partners) and send their collected funds to Kiwanis Children's Fund designated for the Eliminate project. They will help us reach our goal. SLP members have already given over \$100,000. ### **Every Child A Swimmer**

Governor Ron adopted the "Every Child a Swimmer" program as his district project. I will be making presentations at as many of our midyear gatherings as I can.

With nearly 8,000 drowning victims each year, we will make a difference in Missouri and Arkansas. The Every Child a Swimmer program is a "learn to swim and water safety" project sponsored by Kiwanis International as well as Key Club International and CKI international. ECAS works like this: Kiwanis acts as the organizer by contacting and coordinating with school officials, raising funds and publicizing the program. Key Club and other high school students can act as in water trainers in conjunction with a certified swimming instructor.

Our role in this program is to find the students, arrange for pool facilities and find a certified instructor. The instructor may use any accredited station teaching methods, modifying the program to his/her own teaching style.

This program is directed specifically towards teaching children to swim no later than the 4<sup>th</sup> grade. Experience shows that children 8-10 years old are the most receptive to swimming lessons. They generally do not have a fear of the water and are able to comprehend being taught in each station.



#### Getting the Ball Rolling

First, identify a person in your club to meet with the local school officials to discuss the program and how they may be involved.

Second, locate a pool. It can be at a school, a boy's Club or a Y or a city or county pool.

Finally, you may need to advertise to program to raise funds and support from the public.

This program can be run utilizing very few of your members, if you get volunteers for in pool help. Or, a larger number if your members want to get wet.

Costs included can involve the instructor, pool rental, swim suits, ear plugs etc.

And, as with all of our projects, what about liability? This is a good reason to co-sponsor the program with a school or community organization, they will already have liability insurance. The Every Child a Swimmer program is an eligible project for Kiwanis International's General Liability Insurance. You can contact the Risk Management Department to receive a certificate of coverage from Kiwanis International, if needed.


### Key Leader Weekend

Thirteen years, 26 camps, an estimated 1,400 students. What are we referring to? Kiwanis Key Leader Camps, of course!


Since the first camp was started in 2006, the Missouri-Arkansas District has given fantastic leadership opportunities to over 1,000 young people in junior



high and high schools throughout both states. Thanks to Kiwanis Clubs, parents, benefactors and high schools, we have given the best service leadership experience to these students that have changed lives by giving them confidence in their abilities, tools to lead and adults to support them.

The students are divided into small groups, called neighborhoods, that work together on projects throughout the weekend. The challenge course, known as the ropes course, is a team-building time in the great outdoors.

The students learn about goal-setting, team-building, different personality types that can work together, and about giving to others - all while having a lot of fun!

For the first time this year, we are having a Spring Key Leader at Camp War Eagle near Rogers, AR, on April 17-19, 2020. The camp is a site in Northwest Arkansas that we hope can attract students from both states (maybe even

Oklahoma and Kansas) for the Key Leader Weekend experience. For those clubs that were unable to send anyone to

the camps in Missouri and Arkansas this Fall, what a great opportunity you have to send them to Key Leader. Students can be signed up soon (by the end of December) for the camp at <a href="www.key-leader.org">www.key-leader.org</a>. Fees for the camp are \$225 for student participants, \$175 for student facilitators (camp counselors) and \$125 for adult chaperones. We also have a limited amount of slots for Kiwanians who want to help run the weekend at no fee.

#### Bridgeton's Pathway to the Buddy Bench

The Bridgeton Kiwanis Club wanted to do something to help curb bullying and when the idea of buddy bench arose a very years ago it hit home. Pattonville School District and Holy Spirit Catholic School have been dealing with bullying for some time as have many school districts. So, the plan to put a buddy bench at every school began to develop.



The club actually purchased two buddy benches to memorialize two long time members of the club. But as everyone knows that can be expensive and the plan to put one at every school would definitely be a long-term project. However, Mary Kay Campbell discovered GreenTree Plastics. This company takes plastic caps and lids to exchange for recycled



plastic benches. With 250 pounds of caps and lids and \$300 a club can purchase a bench to place in a school to help decrease bullying.

With the help of the Remington Traditional Builders Club, who made this their service project, the Bridgeton Club collected 3,250 pounds of plastic caps and lids and added \$3,900 to get 13 new benches. A group of members then headed to Indiana with a large truck to pick up the benches.

The Club also received donations from area businesses to offset the cost of most of the benches. This has become a large community project and one the club can be most proud to provide to the community.

#### Gladstone Delivers Weekend Food Backpacks






